Welcome to Manchester Cathedral

Welcome to the Cathedral and Collegiate Church of St Mary, St Denys and St George in the heart of the City of Manchester. The building is the old mediaeval parish Church of Manchester. King Henry V first granted it Collegiate status in 1421 and it became Manchester's Cathedral on the creation of the Diocese of Manchester in 1847. It is believed that there has been a church on or near this site for over a thousand years.

A service to mark the beginning of the legal year

There is a long tradition of church services for the judiciary.

Religious services to mark the opening of the legal year, seeking God's blessing on the administration of justice for the coming year, follow from a centuries' old tradition. They are said to have originated on the continent, the first recorded instance being a service held in Notre Dame Cathedral, Paris, in 1245. Although the Assize system on which such services were based has been swept away, they remain of relevance and importance in our modern and inclusive society.

Her Majesty The Queen, at her Coronation, promised to serve the people and to ensure justice was delivered in the Kingdom. Following her example, once a year, for one hour, her Majesty's Judges and others attend the Cathedral and by doing so acknowledge a higher authority than themselves, one recognised by all faiths as a merciful judge.

Although the Cathedral service is a essentially a Christian one, those of other faiths and none are very warmly welcomed.

The service is sponsored by the High Sheriff of Greater Manchester and hosted by the Dean of the Cathedral.

Her Majesty the Queen is represented by the Lord Lieutenant of Greater Manchester.

In attendance and processing are the judiciary from the High Court, Crown and County Courts, Tribunals and Magistrates Courts together with the Lord Mayor and the Mayors of the Boroughs, High Sheriffs of Adjacent counties, The Chief Constable and senior academic and administrative members of the legal profession.

The service is open to all, but most especially all of those associated with the law.

Diane Hawkins, High Sheriff of Greater Manchester

Diane was born in Sale, then a part of Cheshire. She is married to Stephen and they celebrated their Ruby Wedding during lockdown last year. They have two sons, Jonathan (married to Sarah) and Timothy. Their first grandchild Jesse was born in May this year add to the excitement of the Shrieval year.

Educated at Withington Girls' School with the benefit of a Direct Grant from Cheshire County Council, Diane is now the Alumna Governor of the school.

Admitted as a solicitor in 1982, Diane was in practice with Whittles, based in Manchester but covering much of the north of England, acting for Trades Unions. She specialised in litigation on behalf of those suffering from asbestos related diseases. She retired as Managing Partner and Head of Occupational Disease Litigation in 2002.

Sworn in as a Justice of the Peace on the Bolton Bench in June 2005, in 2014 she elected to sit solely in the Family Court, one of the first Justices in the country to do so. Until the end of March she was Deputy Chair of the GM Family Panel.

In 2007 Diane become a trustee of Fortalice, the Bolton Women's Refuge and Outreach Support Centre. In 2011 she became chairman.

As a Queen's Guide, Diane volunteered with her local Cub Pack before university and then for many years was a Cub Leader at her church. Since then, she has had various roles in Scouting and in 2014, she was appointed chairman of Bolton Scout Trust. BST owns and runs Bibbys Farm Scout Camp Site and Activity Centre.

She is currently a trustee of the Manchester Guardian Society Charitable Trust and a member of the Duchy of Lancaster Benevolent Fund panel. This year, she also sits on the Greater Manchester High Sheriff's Police Trust. She is also a long-standing member of the Association of Speakers Clubs, and has served on the National Executive. Diane has been a lay member of the Church of England Provincial disciplinary Panel for some years.

Diane was commissioned as a Deputy Lieutenant of Greater Manchester in 2008 and is deeply honoured to have been appointed by HM The Queen as the High Sheriff of Greater Manchester.

Fortalice The 2021 High Sheriff's Charity

Fortalice has served those affected by domestic abuse in Bolton for over 44 years. From very small beginnings in $1977 - a\ 2\ up\ 2$ down terraced property crammed with 5 families on the day it opened – we now run a purpose-built Refuge with 22 self-contained flats. We offer support and hope to 22 women and their children in the Refuge, helping them to work through their trauma, turn their lives round and go on to live independent, happy and safe lives, free from abuse.

Additionally, we work with over 1000 individuals in the community, women and men, each year. From our Outreach Support Centre, we offer one to one advice, risk assessments and safety planning, group work, a Children and Young Person's service, Adult and Child Counselling and accredited training for professionals. Proud recipients of QAVS in 2014, our volunteers are exceptional and an integral part of what we do.

To demonstrate the impact of our frontline services, here is what a client said of Fortalice "the day following the assault I didn't understand why I was talking to Fortalice, I had told the police everything that had happened - so why do I need to tell you as well? Robyn is the Principal Rabbi at Manchester Reform Synagogue and after studying Theology and Religious Studies at Newnham College, Cambridge, practised as a human right lawyer. Robyn is a passionate social justice activist and is co-chair of Greater Manchester Citizens (a broad-based community organising movement). As well as being a chaplain of the One Love team for the universities, Robyn is also a member of the Research Impact Advisory Group of Religions and Theology at the University of Manchester. Robyn has published journal articles and other works, including a chapter in the recently published book – 'Mapping Faith: Theologies of Migration and Community'. Robyn also regularly appears on BBC Radio Manchester, Radio 4's Beyond Belief and is a Pause for Thought contributor. In 2020 Robyn as named as one of the 40 under 40s in the wider community. Robyn is interested in creating relational, textured, activist communities built by individuals who are enabled to step into their own power through Torah and community to collectively organise for a more just world.
